Vital Resources for Those Impacted By the Government Shutdown

Sadly, the U. S. House of Representatives has been out of session for nearly 50 days. This stalemate now stands as the most extended shutdown in U.S. history, a sobering marker of political dysfunction and moral decay in our nation's leadership.

Turning away from the suffering of others is not only poor leadership—it is a moral failure. Using hunger and hardship as political weapons is unconscionable and violates the divine command to "do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God" (Micah 6:8). It also violates God's greatest command to, "love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39).

SHUTDOWN RESOURCES FOR FEDERAL EMPLOYEES

Unemployment Insurance (UI):

• Some employees impacted by furlough may be eligible to receive unemployment benefits. Note, waiting periods by state vary, and most states require that the UI benefits be repaid after retroactive pay is received.

Information for Federal Workers

Food Resources:

- <u>Feeding America</u>: "Find Free Food and Groceries". Your local food bank can help you find food today, even if you need temporary help. They partner with food pantries, soup kitchens, and meal programs in your local community to give away free food. Enter your zip code to find the food bank partnering with Feeding America. They'll share the locations and hours of nearby food distributions.
- <u>Food Pantries of America Welcome to FoodFinder!</u> You can call or text your ZIP code and get referrals to local food assistance providers (pantries, soup kitchens, etc.)

- United Way / 211- Dial 211 (in most parts of the U.S.) to reach a community resource line. They maintain up-to-date local listings for food pantries, emergency food assistance, etc.

 offers information about food assistance programs and can help direct you to local resources.

Mental Health and Wellness Resources:

- <u>Wellfed</u> offers three recurring weekly virtual programs designed to provide structure, support and momentum for professionals navigating career transitions.
- Technologists for the Public Good has partnered with Empower Work to provide <u>free, confidential counseling</u>.

- The <u>Navy Federal Credit Union</u> is offering zero interest loans of up to \$6,000 to its members and other federal government employees during the shutdown. Call 888-842-6328 for assistance.
- The <u>United States Senate Federal Credit Union</u> is offering zero interest loans for 90-days of up to \$5,000 during the shutdown. This credit union is not just for Senate employees. Federal employees can become a member of this credit union by becoming a member of the American Consumer Council, the US Capitol Historical Association, or the Senate Federal Credit Union Foundation and are eligible for interest free loans during the shutdown. Call 800-374-2758 for assistance.



- <u>FEEA.org: Federal Employee Education & Assistance Fund</u>.Offers Emergency Hardship Loans and Shutdown grants federal civilian employees in need.
- The <u>Navy Federal Credit Union</u> is offering zero interest loans of up to \$6,000 to its members and other federal government employees during the shutdown. Call 888-842-6328 for assistance.
- The <u>United States Senate Federal Credit Union</u> is offering zero interest loans for 90-days of up to \$5,000 during the shutdown. This credit union is not just for Senate employees. Federal employees can become a member of this credit union by becoming a member of the American Consumer Council, the US Capitol Historical Association, or the Senate Federal Credit Union Foundation and are eligible for interest free loans during the shutdown. Call 800-374-2758 for assistance.
- The <u>Congressional Federal Credit Union</u> is offering zero interest Furlough Relief loans of up to \$10,000 during the shutdown. You do not have to be a Congressional employee to join this credit union. Federal workers can become a member of this credit union by joining the "<u>Friends of the National Arboretum</u>".
 Call 800-491-2328 for assistance.
- The <u>Commerce Department Credit Union</u> is offering 30-day zero interest loans for federal workers during the shutdown for up to \$10,000. You do not have to be a Commerce Department employee to become a member. Anyone who joins the American Consumer Council can join this credit union. Call 888-626-9845 for assistance.
- Army Emergency Relief provides interest-free loans equal to the amount of one paycheck, up to a maximum amount of \$6,000, for soldiers and families who experience financial hardship due to a lack of pay. Call 866-878-63788 for assistance.
- The <u>U.S. Employees Credit Union</u> is offering interest-free shutdown loans to eligible members. Call 312-922-5310 for assistance.
- <u>USAA's Government Shutdown Program</u> is offering no-interest loans and other payment relief options from \$500 to \$6,000. Call 210-531-8722 for assistance.
- <u>PenFed</u> is offering zero-interest loans equal to the amount of missed paychecks for furloughed federal workers who are existing members and have their pay directly deposited to their PenFed account. Call 1-800-247-5626 for assistance.
